Quick Reference List to Major Fellowships:

Churchill – graduate study in math or science at Cambridge

Compton – one year of funding for students interested in environmental issues, peace and conflict resolution, population and reproductive health, or climate change and energy policy.

DAAD – graduate study in Germany

Dale – independent project in any field (Only available to graduating Princeton seniors.)

Ford – graduate study

Fulbright – one year of study/research in another country (not the U.S.). You must have a proposal, an independent project of your own design, something that you can implement within a year's time period, that you have the ability to undertake successfully and that will benefit you, the designated country, and ultimately, the world.

Gates – graduate study at Cambridge

Hertz – graduate study in the applied physical sciences

Ito – research at a Japanese university

Javits – graduate study in the arts, humanities, or social sciences

Keasbey – graduate study for two years in the UK. Only selected East Coast schools are invited on a rotating basis. The rotation is usually scheduled for every three years; therefore, the next anticipated invitation for Princeton will be in 2010-11.

Labouisse – independent projects, especially in the fields of development or modernization (Only available to graduating Princeton seniors.)

Luce – work in Asia, not study. To gain exposure to Asian society and culture that would not otherwise be possible. This award is not applicable to those with substantial experience in Asia.

Marshall – graduate study at any UK university

Mitchell – graduate study at any Irish university

NSF – graduate study in the sciences or a social science

ReachOut 56-81 – public interest projects (Only available to graduating Princeton seniors.)

Rhodes – graduate study at Oxford

Rotary – graduate study in another country (Apply in the SPRING of your junior year for a fellowship beginning AFTER graduation.)

Sachs – study at Worcester College, Oxford, or independent project (Only available to graduating Princeton seniors.)

All citizens of all countries, except the UK, can apply to the Gates.
