# Princeton-in-Asia

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## WHAT IS PRINCETON-IN-ASIA?

Princeton-in-Asia (PiA) is an independent, non-profit organization located at Princeton University. Founded by students in 1898, the program has long been driven by a mission to foster cross-cultural understanding between Asians and Americans by giving young people opportunities to live and work in Asia. As employees of a variety of Asian institutions, PiA interns gain work experience while providing valuable services to their Asian hosts. It is PiA's vision that through extended exposure to Asian workplaces and cultures, interns will develop a life-long appreciation for that region of the world.

In the summer of 2005, PiA will offer a small number of short term internships in Asia. The post-graduate program will offer approximately 65 full-year internships in the following countries: China (including Hong Kong), Japan, Kazakhstan, Laos, Malaysia, Singapore, South Korea, Taiwan, Thailand, and Vietnam.

## WHAT IS PIA LOOKING FOR IN ITS SUMMER PROGRAM APPLICANTS?

The PiA summer internship programs are only offered to Princeton undergraduates. We're looking for open-minded, selfmotivated, enthusiastic, and hardworking students. Previous travel and cross-cultural experience is helpful but not essential. While some positions require specific academic preparation or journalism experience, the teaching internships are open to all undergraduates. Those interested in applying for teaching positions should have (or plan to have) some experience teaching or tutoring non-native speakers prior to leaving for Asia. A short TESL (Teaching English as a Second Language) course is offered in the Spring at Princeton. Applications for the TESL course will be available in the second semester at the PiA office.

#### WHAT ARE THE CHANCES OF PLACEMENT?

Applicant numbers vary from year to year. In recent years, there have been roughly 3-5 applicants for each position.

#### CONSIDERATIONS AND GENERAL APPLICATION ADVICE

In addition to a stipend and assistance with housing arrangements, PiA and Princeton provide:

- \* a pre-departure orientation including travel, health, visa, safety, and packing information as well as discussion about cultural and current affairs in PiA countries.
- \* group medical insurance for all interns in need of coverage. Students may use their student insurance while overseas for the summer.
- \* a limited amount of travel assistance. The summer internships generally do not include airfare. However, PiA offers some travel grants, and interns are encouraged to apply for various grants available through the university.

We encourage you to stop by the PiA office, Room 202 in Bobst Hall, and familiarize yourself with the specific posts early in the application process.

February 18: Deadline for submission of application.
<b>Late February:</b> Interviews to be held at Princeton. These interviews also provide an opportunity for applicants to ask questions about locations and positions.
Mid-March: PiA notifies applicants of selection results.
March-April: Finalization of positions.
Early May: Pre-Departure Orientation. All new interns must attend the orientation.
June - Mid-July: New interns leave for Asia.

Application Checklist Please deliver your completed application to the Princeton-in-Asia office by February 18, 2004.
Application Fee: \$20.00.
A completed PiA Application Form and two essays (see below).
Two copies of your resume <b>(one page in length)</b> including your current and permanent addresses and phone numbers.
An official college transcript (as recent as possible).
Contact information for two references (phone number and/or email address). Letters are optional.
One photocopy of your currently valid passport information page (which includes passport number, period of validity, etc.). *All applicants must have a valid passport by the time of interviews.
Four passport size photos with your name printed on the back of each and put in an envelope.
Essay #1: What I Hope to Gain (750 words or less): A PiA internship is a rare opportunity to live and work in another country. What attracted you to the position and what do you hope to gain by spending this time abroad?
<b>Essay #2: Handling Transition</b> (750 words or less): Discuss an event which caused a major change in your life. How did you deal with the transition? What aspects of this transition were the most difficult, and what do you feel you learned? Would you do anything differently?
