Jeffrey Hass is Associate Professor of Sociology at the University of Richmond and Professor with the Faculty of Economics at St. Petersburg State University in Russia. His research interests relate to the human capacity for action, with a focus on power, culture, and practice. His research investigates questions of motivation and agency: why we do what we do, whether we act from compulsion or autonomous desire, and how social practices persist and change. His scholarship analyzes the nature of "institutions" and "structures" as social phenomena that too often are taken for granted. His books include Power, Culture, and Economic Change in Russia: To the Undiscovered Country of Post-Socialism, 1988-2008 (2011), Rethinking the Post Soviet Experience: Markets, Moral Economies and Cultural Contradictions of Post Socialist Russia (2011), and Economic Sociology: An Introduction (2007), and he is currently writing two books on the blockade of Leningrad. Hass received his Ph.D. in Sociology from Princeton.

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
