• PROBLEM SETS

The course webpage contains a link for problems, 18 for each of the five chapters 2-6 of the textbook

In working any given problem, you may assume the results of all earlier-numbered problems

(and of the chapter to which the problem set is attached)

For each written assignment, choose 4 out of the odd-numbered problems 7, 9, 11, 13, 15

The even-numbered problems 8, 10, 12, 14, 16 will be assigned to students for oral presentation:

what matters here, in contrast to the written assignment, is effort, not necessarily correctness

1-6 for each chapter will be presented orally by the instructor in class

17 & 18 will not be included during the term, but some may appear on last written assignment

• SUBMISSION OF ASSIGNMENTS

Should be electronic, preferably typed, but a scan of a handwritten document is acceptable if legible

• LATENESS

Penalty of 1 point per weekday on a scale of 100, to a maximum of 10 =
